Keep safe this bushfire season

With temperatures soaring and the planet confronting an El Niño that is likely to last until at least April, Australians need to be on high alert for bushfires. The Tasmania Fire Service provides tips and advice at bushfire.tas.gov.au.

- 1. Create or update your Bushfire Plan.
- 2. Talk about your Bushfire Plan with family, neighbours and friends.
- 3. Clear your property and prepare an emergency kit.
- 4. Know when to leave and where to go.
- 5. Check ABC local radio, TasALERT (www.TasALERT.com), TFS Website (fire.tas.gov.au) and TFS Social Media for the latest news, warnings and alerts.
- 6. Monitor the weather (bom.gov.au) and know if a total fire ban is in place.

Understand bushfire warnings and alerts



ADVICE: A fire is burning. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes. (May also be used to advise that a threat has reduced.)



WATCH AND ACT: A fire is burning and conditions are changing. Start taking action now to protect yourself and others.




EMERGENCY WARNING: An Emergency Warning is the highest level of warning. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay may put your life at risk.



SMOKE ALERT: Provides information about smoke from a fire, bushfire or fuel reduction burn that may impact a community or areas of Tasmania.

The Australian Fire Danger Ratings (AFDRS) levels are:

Andrew's Canberra report card for 2023

Animal welfare: The Federal Government intends to phase out live sheep exports to the Middle East. But live cattle exports will be ongoing, and there is still no body to effectively oversee animal welfare generally.

Asylum seekers: Approximately 19,000 refugees on Temporary Protection Visas and Safe Haven Enterprise Visas have been provided a pathway to permanency. However, about 12,000 people are still languishing on temporary visas, and we still have mandatory detention, offshore processing and boat tow-backs, all immoral and illegal under international law.

Environment: Renewable energy ramping up and action on the Murray-Darling Basin. But overshadowed by a commitment to approve more coal and gas projects, legislation allowing carbon pollution dumping at sea and poor progress on environmental law reform. Carbon reduction targets still inadequate.

Foreign policy: The Government has bolstered Australia's relationships with allies and partners, repaired Pacific relationships and stabilised the Australia-China relationship. Some serious missteps though over the war in Gaza.

Gambling: Good progress with the introduction of BetStop that will let people exclude themselves from online gambling, as well as a bill to ban the use of credit cards for online wagering. Mixed signals on gambling advertising reform.

Health: The rollout of Urgent Care Clinics and 60-day medicine dispensing are potentially positive reforms. But the health system is in perpetual crisis and critical reforms, like restoring the value of the GP Medicare rebate by doubling it, remain unaddressed.

Housing: Although the \$10 billion Housing Australia Future Fund and the additional \$3 billion directly towards social and affordable housing will provide some relief, there's been no progress on tax reform and other measures to address the housing crisis. Moreover, Australia's record high migration intake might be boosting the economy, but it's also turbocharging the housing crisis.

Integrity: The creation of the National Anti-Corruption Commission is a huge step forward in restoring trust in politics. However, effective protections for whistleblowers are still lacking, media freedom laws remain inadequate and it remains to be seen where the Government goes with political donation reform.

Antarctica on thin ice

Hobart is the gateway to the Antarctic, serving as the nerve centre for international scientific research and conservation efforts in the area. But the recent push for \$25 million in savings in the Australian Antarctic Division is galling. Reports suggesting that field research on the continent is being reviewed, and that two of our permanent bases will be under-staffed this summer are alarming to say the least. This comes at a time when Antarctic sea ice is at record lows, Antarctic temperatures are at record highs and the increased impacts of climate change are being felt across the globe.

Macquarie Wharf is also in a terrible state of disrepair on account of years of State Government disinterest and underinvestment. This is undermining Australia's ability to meet current Antarctic research needs, let alone support the growth of the sector.

Moreover, our new \$528 million ice breaker, the RSV Nuyina, can't fit under the Tasman Bridge to be refuelled at Selfs Point, instead for now having to travel the 1,200 kilometre round trip to Burnie to refuel.

Tasmania has the world's best Antarctic scientists and experts. But they're skating on thin ice right now due to years of poor government policy and planning, and chronic government underinvestment. Andrew believes this must be turned around as a national priority, and has called on all levels of government to make meaningful decisions and investments to enhance our Antarctic infrastructure, significantly bolster on-ice and atsea research, and demonstrably honour Australia's Antarctic Treaty obligations.

Clark swimming in shallow waters

The Glenorchy War Memorial Pool has been a great source of pride for the community for some 60 years, providing people with a place to exercise, convalesce and have fun with family and friends. It's no surprise then that many in the community are dismayed to hear that the pool is closed indefinitely due to safety concerns, and quite possibly is set to close permanently. Glenorchy City Council is currently assessing its options. Andrew raised the matter in the Federal Parliament recently and called

for all levels of government to work together to find a solution to save the Glenorchy Pool.

The much needed upgrades at the Doone Kennedy Hobart Aquatic Centre have been put on pause due to steeply rising costs. The Centre was set to receive a new warm-water hydrotherapy pool thanks to joint funding from Hobart City Council, the State Government and the Federal Government, but rising prices has meant there is a \$7 million shortfall compared with the original funding of the project.

Greater Hobart is in dire need of good pool facilities, especially therapy pools, and it's vital the Glenorchy Pool is saved and fixed, and that the Doone Kennedy upgrade goes ahead. While ultimately these are decisions for councils, Andrew will continue to look for ways to help.



Out and about in the community



Andrew recently visited **Tassie Mums** to check out the new shelves, workbench and storage baskets that were purchased through a federal grant. The organisation provides essential baby and children's items to social service organisations across Tasmania who are working with vulnerable and at-risk children. On average, Tassie Mums help five children every day of the year, sending out more than \$700,000 worth of children's items annually.

New pedestrian crossings, garden beds, benches and bike stands have all been installed as part of the upgrades to the New Town shopping precinct. The finished project, which was largely funded by the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program, was launched recently with a street party. The upgrades will make the area safer for pedestrians and support businesses.


However, this is only a stop-gap measure and more needs to be done to restore trust after Robodebt had people terrified of incurring debts. Robodebt was a catastrophic failure of government administration that destroyed the lives of countless Australians and all eyes will be on the Federal Government as it implements all the recommendations of the Robodebt Royal Commission. This is particularly important when it comes to the recommendations on face-to-face services, increasing the number of social workers and reinstating the limitation of six years on debt recovery.

The FindHelpTAS directory is searchable via region and service type (eg emergency, housing, mental health, etc). Over the holiday period it is recommended you give service providers a call before presenting in person as operating hours and service capacity may vary.
